Your Regional officers hope each of you and your families had a safe and happy holiday and New Year. We have been busy developing ASHRAE's strategic plan and attending the Chicago Winter Meeting.

In October we began developing the strategic plan at a special board meeting in Atlanta. The planning committee took the preliminary plan we developed and refined it. We were presented this version last week and it is an exciting and energetic plan looking at where ASHRAE wants to be to serve our members and the global environment that we live in.

The draft contains four strategic directions: 1. ASHRAE will lead the advancement of sustainable building design and operations, 2. ASHRAE will be a world –class provider of education and certification programs, 3. ASHRAE will position itself as the premier provider of HVAC&R expertise, and 4. ASHRAE will lead the global HVAC&R community. Under each of these directions are strategies. Plans will then be developed to achieve each strategy by various committees, consultants and outside vendors that are needed to accomplish these exciting directions by ASHRAE.

The Chicago meeting was the largest in ASHRAE history with 60,000 in attendance at the Exposition. There were over 1900 exhibitors. There were 14 symposiums, 62 seminars, 26 forums and over 100 technical committees, task groups, technical resource groups and ad hoc committee meetings. It was a busy week for your regional officers.

Strength in Chapters

- **Effective Chapter Meetings**

The topic for this issues' column is "**An Active Chapter Board**". To start the discussion lets review the Manual for Chapter Operations for an understanding of the board consisting of its composition and its duties. The "Board" as it is sometimes referred to is actually called "The Board of Governors". "The Board of Governors manages and conducts conduct the affairs of the Chapter in accordance with the bylaws of the chapter and has supervision and care of all property of the chapter". This is not a duty to be taken lightly. Our board members not only have the duty of successfully operating the chapter and furthering ASHRAE's technical goals in their area, but have the task of raising and administering the funds to accomplish the above. A number of chapters have also created scholarships and maintain endowment funds to support them. In some cases the funds are large and their administration carries a great deal of responsibility.

According to the MCO, "The Board of Governors consists of the chapters' elected officers, the most recent past president and other members elected by the membership in accordance with the chapter bylaws". With all of this responsibility, we need to find and develop the right leaders to accomplish the duties of the board.

One of the largest challenges facing ASHRAE is finding volunteer members to accomplish the work of our Society. Active volunteer members must be grown. There are many volunteer jobs in ASHRAE ranging from a chapter committee member to the President. The fact that our work is accomplished by member volunteers and that our technical work is subjected to multiple peer review is why ASHRAE is recognized as the preeminent authority in our industry. Volunteers can give from a couple of hours a month to the equivalent hours of a full time job. All of the efforts of our volunteers are very important no matter how few hours are contributed.

It is from these small commitments where future leaders are recognized. They become further motivated by learning how large and important our work is. I started by volunteering a couple of hours serving as Chapter Treasurer.

After attending a couple of CRC's, learning more about ASHRAE and its work, and enjoying the fellowship of other similarly motivated professionals, I found many reasons to continue to be further involved in our Society. That is how it starts! I apologize for getting a little carried away, but I cannot help being enthusiastic about ASHRAE and what being involved in it has done for me. That is another subject for another day.

When we go searching for active and effective Board Members and Officers we should be looking at people who have already demonstrated responsibility and may have had the opportunity to have served in small capacities like a chapter committee member. As chapter leaders we should not be just grabbing someone to fill a position. Sticking a warm body in a slot could allow a non motivated person on the board, creating a weak link and discouraging others from being active and effective. We have a lot of small chapters in our region. Volunteers may be hard to find. Sometimes grabbing a warm body may be absolutely necessary, but I discourage the practice of always doing so. As chapter leaders we must develop depth in our chapters and grow leadership through continued service, knowledge, and dedication. We should strive to build depth in our chapters no matter what size because depth in leadership creates an active and motivated board. This in turn provides strong chapters that provide future strong regional leaders. Some of Region III's best chapters are small ones with a motivated and active board. An active board is a must for a strong chapter.

In closing I am going to get a little ahead of plan and touch on the knowledge of ASHRAE, which is the subject of my next column in the April issue of the Regionaire. The reason for doing so is to bring up the President Elect Workshop to be held on April 8th in Baltimore. This where you can increase your knowledge of Society and where you can learn from the Regional Officers and other Region III Chapter Officers how to effectively run your chapter. Attendance in this session is not limited to Chapter President Elects only. Current Vice Presidents and Secretary's who will be your chapter's future presidents are also encouraged to attend. Their added knowledge will make them better more effective chapter leaders now and also in the future. It is also an opportunity to share in ASHRAE fellowship in a less formal atmosphere than a CRC. There are plans to attend an Orioles Baseball Game the night before the workshop. This social event was widely suggested by the attendees of last year's workshop. Last call for ticket purchases as a group will be this week. I will be sending out a separate e-mail notice to all chapter officers. I look forward to seeing all of you there.

Since the Region III CRC '05, 8/11-13/05, held in Roanoke, Gary and I have attended two Society Nominating Meetings in Chicago. The first was held on 11/12-13/05 at which we represented Region III by advancing your nominations for various officer positions and also forwarded your recommendations for awards to the Society Honors and Awards Committee for their consideration. At the second meeting, held on 1/22/06, the slate of candidates for the 2006-07 Society year was finalized.

The individuals that the Region III chapters nominated at CRC '05 undergo final confirmation in February and will be announced in March. For our region, this includes for the 2006-07 year, a new Director and Regional Chairman (DRC) and a new Regional Vice Chairman (RVC) for Research Promotion.

Also at this time you should select those individuals whose service to the chapter, region and/or Society deserve recognition through the various Honors and Awards (detailed information can be accessed on the ASHRAE website at www.ashrae.org under the tab "About ASHRAE" click on "Honors and Awards").

April through May should be spent confirming individuals' willingness to serve and preparing their biographies and letters of submittal.

During June and July, you should complete your final preparations for CRC '06 in Pittsburgh to be held on 8/10-12/06. In addition to completing your chapter's report and motions to be presented at the business meeting on Friday 8/11/06, you should prepare your chapter's final nominations for various regional and Society officers, recommendations for Society Standing Committee positions and submissions for Honors and Awards to be presented at the caucus on Thursday evening, 8/10/06.

ASHRAE Winter Meeting/Expo

I just got back from the ASHRAE Winter Meeting and Expo in Chicago (hopefully, you were there too!). It was a great opportunity for me to see the vendor's displays, to attend a number of technical programs (symposiums, forums, and seminars), and to take part in the Grassroots and Technical Committees where my interests lie.

I can honestly say that the Chapter Technology Transfer Committee meeting in Chicago was the most informative set of CTT² meetings yet. The presentations from our consultants on Government Activities, Refrigeration, Energy, and Technology had me on the edge of my seat thinking about where our industry is headed, and how our changing world will affect the way I provide services to my clients.

Our Committee meeting was interrupted at several points by visiting Liaisons from other Committees offering suggestions and promoting opportunities for working together. The College of ASHRAE Fellows is in the process of developing a speaker's bureau similar to the Distinguished Lecturers program that will be another resource for high quality speakers to the Chapters. It will probably be another year before they are ready for launch. The ASHRAE Learning Institute is extremely interested in working with the Chapters to host joint ALI/Chapter initiatives based on the existing ALI courses that have been developed. Finally, the Presidential Committee on Advocacy is looking for ways to reach out through the ASHRAE Chapters and Chapter membership to interface with all levels of Federal, State, and local government. We asked them to provide us with a list of Advocacy Committee members who would be willing to travel to the Chapters in the coming year to explain the new position on advocacy and to solicit feedback from the Chapter membership at Chapter meetings. I predict this will be a very hot topic for the next couple of years.

Technology Awards

Another hot topic in Chicago was the state of the Technology Awards. There are those in Society who are concerned about the current formulation of the Technology Awards. Currently, the awards are formulated to recognize Design Engineers for innovative approaches to the application of technologies that affect the built environment. The current thrust is toward Designers, and toward innovative design. In order to be seriously considered, a Technology Award submission must include innovation and data to backup the success of the application.

Last year we had ten entries for Technology Awards at the Regional level in Region III. Of those ten, two were submitted from our Region for consideration at the Society level. Neither of those submissions won Society level awards because they did not provide sufficient backup data with regard to their energy consumption and the designs were not deemed sufficiently innovative.

I'm sure there are a huge number of projects in our Region that would be ideal candidates for ASHRAE Technology Awards under the current configuration. The submission deadline to the Regional Competition is May 15. Don't wait! Put your promotional committee to work to get the word out.

And if you would like to comment on the structure of the Technology Awards, I would be happy to collect your comments and bring them to Quebec for our next meeting in June.

Finally, a number of folks indicated that they would like to see some award winning entries at CRC. Well, you can see the winners in the ASHRAE Journal, but I take your point. We'll be spending a bit more time on the awards at CRC next year. If you want a focus on these awards, let me know. The more I hear, the more time we'll spend on it.

As we have passed the midyear, let us take a moment to review our performance in Membership Promotion as a Region. With monthly data through the end of December, Region III is making progress in meeting its goal of a delinquency rate of 9%. Currently our delinquency rate is 12.6%. This is the direct result of all of the hard work being performed in contacting delinquents and we need to continue this effort for the remainder of this society year. If we continue to follow up, we will break the 9% goal before the end of the year. However, the Membership Promotion goal of 10% New Members is in jeopardy, as our current number of New Members is **3.28%**. In addition, we are short of our Advancements goal of 2%, with the Region, which is currently at **0.22%**.

During the remaining months of the fiscal year, it is important that we **continue promoting membership**, and the benefits ASHRAE has to offer. I challenge each Membership Promotion Chairman to personally secure at least 5 new chapter members, and 2 new advancements before June 30th. Enlist the help of your Chapter Presidents, board members and your membership promotion committee members to ensure that your chapter will be strong long after your term as Membership Promotion Chairman has expired.

A healthy sustainable Chapter requires new members, and the only way to obtain new members is to spread the word about the tremendous benefits ASHRAE has to offer. In addition, it is vitally important to retain current members by implementing a phone campaign to contact all members that haven't paid their dues.

Remember: Prior Planning Prevents Poor Performance.

So plan for the future of your Chapters, and promote ASHRAE Membership

Communication - one of the keys to a Chapter's success.

This one term is indeed the key to a Chapter's success in operation and member service. The most effective method of communication, short of face-to-face dialogue, is a properly maintained website. Through this medium one can read the current and perhaps archived copies of the newsletter, browse through the Chapter Programs for the year, investigate the upcoming program for content and read up on the speaker's profile, check out upcoming special events such as Golf Outings, Seminars, etc., and so on.

The key is to properly maintain the website. If one visits a website and repeatedly finds stale outdated information, such as Seminars listed for the 2002-2003 year, this site is not going to be revisited. The Chapter has potentially lost the attention of a Member that someone in Membership Promotion has spent quite a bit of time encouraging their involvement. Once this happens the effort to regain the involvement of this person is fairly significant, multiply this by the number of potentially disenfranchised members and it is a daunting task.

All Chapter Websites are linked from the Region III Website unless these sites are stale. I will disable the link until such time as the site is maintained. The maintenance of a website is fairly simple. The Webmaster position is one where a Chapter can employ the services of a Student member who might have been previously uninvolved. A Student is ideal for this position because he/she is most likely more proficient with computers and HTML editing software than the typical ASHRAE Member. I encourage **ALL** Chapters to engage a Webmaster / Communications Chair and to maintain their Websites.
